MAJOR GENERAL FRANK WILLOUGHBY MOORMAN

Frank Willoughby MOORMAN was born in Camp Jossam, Phillippine Islands, February 25, 1912. He was graduated from the U. S. Military Academy, June 12, 1934, commissioned a second lieutenant of Infantry and assigned to the Twelfth Infantry at Fort Washington, Maryland. In July 1935, he was transferred to the 21st Infantry at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii.

General Moorman entered the Infantry School in September 1937; was graduated in June 1938. He entered the Signal Corps School in September 1938 and was graduated in June 1939. He then was assigned to the 4th (later 6th) Signal Company and remained with it until the summer of 1941, at which time he remained until war was declared. Shortly after the outbreak of hostilities, the 82nd Infantry Division was organized and General Moorman was ordered to it as its Signal Officer. He remained with the 82nd Infantry (later Airborne) Division through the campaigns of Sicily, Italy, and Normandy as its Signal Officer and later as the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4.

On the organization of the XVIII Corps (Airborne) in the summer of 1944, he joined that headquarters as its Assistant Chief of Staff G-4, remaining with it throughout the various campaigns in which it participated in Europe. After a brief post war period of service in the Far East, he returned to Italy in the fall of 1945 as a member of the Theater staff.

General Moorman served with the United Nations Military Staff Committee in New York City from September 1946 until June 1947. He spent the following year as a student at the Industrial College of the Armed Forces and then served for two years as an instructor at the Command and General Staff College.

In July 1950, General Moorman joined the Army General Staff in Washington, leaving in January 1951 for a brief period of service with the Eighth Army Staff in Korea. From April 1951 to May 1952 he served as Secretary of the General Staff of General Headquarters Far East Command, and left that job to go to Paris as an assistant adviser to the Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics and Administration, SHAPE, stopping off for six months en route at the Army Language School Presidio of Monterey, California.

On August 31, 1953, he was appointed Secretary of the General Staff in Department of the Army. Subsequent to that assignment, General Moorman was assigned 2 December 1955 as Military Attache to France, where he served until his assignment as Commanding General of the U. S. Army Electronic Proving Ground at Fort Huachuca. In February 1960 to July 1963 he was assigned to SHAPE, Paris, as Chief Signal Officer. General Moorman has been awarded the Legion of Merit with three Oak Leaf Clusters, the Bronze Star Medal, and the Commendation Ribbon. He assumed command of U. S. Army Electronics Command on 30 August 1963.
